## 14yr old Shot

#### **POLICE Harass Mother of Victim**

Early Friday evening a fourteen year old Black youth was shot in his genitals by a Highland Park cop. The bullet passed through Willie Ba'ter's thigh into his scrotum (Privates) ripping the zipper out of the boy's pants and nearly castrating him.

Though Willie was seen running from the direction of a supposedly stolen for there has been no explanation offered by the Highland Park Police for shooting an obviously unarmed, possibly innocent child. According to Mrs. Jean Sanders a witness, even the policemans' Negro partner was shocked by the senseless shooting. Mrs. Sanders, who lives at 299 Labelle, across the street from where the shooting too place, said the partner ran into the alley where Willie lay, shouting, "Did you shoot the boy? Did you shoot the boy?" When he saw the bleeding child lying sprawled among overturned garbage cans, the oliceman's negro partner said. The dream of Warren and Freda Ellington went up in fire and smoke Monday, Oct. 13... The dream of a modern printing plant and publishing company to be owned and operated by black citizens.

They were well on their way to realizing that dream, for they had obtained, after a long hard struggle and many sacrifices, modern printing equipment in thar Lafayette Printing plant, 970 Gratiot They had also just turned out the 30th issue of their independant weekly newspaper, the Detroit Journal, the sales of which were growing rapidly.

But in the early morning of Oct.

13, a mysterious fire gutted the entire building and wiped them out. The fire is still a mystery How-

ever, an investigation is underway. Warren Ellington looks back on beginning at the Gratiot address when he went to work for the Detroit Tribune Publishing Co. 17 years ago, and how he had progressed into ownership and ultimately becoming the owner of the largest printing company to be owned and operated by a black citizen

Many black youths served their apprenticeship in the printing trade under his instruction and were subsequently hired by various firms. They had to be accepted into the

biased Printer's Union after receiving the training from Ellington, and many would have never been accepted were it not or his efforts.

Mr. Ellington hopes to be back into the business in a few weeks. "It means starting over," he said, "but I can't quit now. There

#### ANTI-WAR OFFICE ATTACKED

The Detroit Committee to End the War in Vietnam, supporters of black militancy, were victims of a sneak attack early Sunday morning, October 29th.

The Deewy, with headquarters at 1101 W. Warren, coordinated the Detroit groups that went to Washington on Oct. 21st to protest the War in Vietnam.

In what is apparently a series of attacks on radical and progres sive organizations, the anti-war offices were entered for a second time this year and vandalized. In this latest attack, as in the pre-vious one, some of the records and files were taken. Those left were mixed with other printed matter and scattered over the floor. Two typewriters were smashed beyond repair, and the office furniture was broken and

tion they receive.

Late last week several hundred Late last week several hundred students left McMichael Jr. High after a fire alarm was pulled to demonstrate their disgust for inferior and irrelevant education.

Carrying Black Power signs they set upicket lines around the school.

school.

Several of the students, say white cops approached those carrying signs, ripped them up, and beat the persons who had been carrying them.

Miss Beverly Bell, 15 yr. old 9A McMichael student has organized The Inner-City Jr. Schools for Black Americans.

She and her organization which epresents a majority of the students have confronted the principal Feinstein with a list of demands ranging from the establish ment of a Black History class to the teaching of Swahili.

They have some support from black teachers at McMichael.

The plan is to establish if necessary a freedom school similar to the one started by boycotting Northern High students in 1 66.

Northwestern High adjacent to McMichael has also initiated a protest over lunch room facilities.

Feinstein's only reply has been that the students make their demands to the Board of Education.

Miss Bell the student organizer says "If the Board refuses to acknowledge and act on our demands

we are going to the streets."
Reverend Albert Cleage along with the CCAC (City Wide Citizens Action Committee) have joined forces with McMichael students to make the school a place where black can be educated, rather than being held captive six hours

#### **BLACKS IN AND OUT OF MARCH**

The black contingent in the Oct. 21 anti war march fell apart. Approximately 80 black people from Detroit, and an estimated 100 more blacks from around the country gathered at a designated spot near the Lincoln Memorial, only to be told by delegates from Phila., N.Y., and Chicago, that it would be inadvisable for black people to take part in the march. They had received word that the law enforcers of Washington were preparing to "Beat heads" and it was felt that Black people had been beaten enough. It was proposed that the Black

people present take part in an alternate march through the Black ghetto of Washington and a rally to be held at a park across from Howard University, at which three

Early last week nine black women were fired from the Goodwill Industries, Inc. without notice Eight of the nine handicapped women filed complaints against the director of the Goodwill Industries here in Detroit.

In the complaint, the women stated they were given severance , along with one white woman, and replaced by eight white women

The women declared that when they sought explanations they were told that they had violated com-

pany poli y in making purchases. Robert Tindal, Executive Sec-retary of the Detroit branch of the NAACP, failed to reach the director of the Goodwill Industries by hone, but was given an explanation to which he protested on the phone as being vague. No substancial reason was given.

ager of sales at the store had come to the firm with good re commendations from Saks Fifth Avenue, and had been with Goodwill Industries, Inc., four months. The other women had senority up to thirteen years.

The women charge that Lawrence Gass, assistant to manager Walter Handlin, showed strong anti-black sentiments. They described his attitude as "snotty" and that when he gave the woman their last pay checks, told them, "get out and stay out."

The women also accused Gass taking furniture from the store without paying the cashier and that Handlin would ring up sales for Gass without de ositing money into the cas't register

The nine women have also filed charges with the Michigan Civil Rights Commission against Goodwill Industries. \* \*



## Paul Robeson Honored as Star

PAUL ROBESON has been nominated for the National Football Hall of Fame. Because of a campaign launched by journalism students at Rutgers University, he may receive the first recompense for the dishonor he was subjected to during the McCarthy years.

For a decade Robeson was a political exile from the U.S., barred from displaying his huge talent in his own country because he was a black man who would not yield in his opposition to racism and war.

An all-American end for Rut-

gers in 1917 and 1918, Robeson ranks as one of the first nationally prominent black atheletes in the U.S. Albert Twitchell, athletic director at the New Jersey school, calls Robeson "the best football player Rutgers has ever had."

For many years Robeson's name was omitted from all alumni publications and publicity by Rutgers University. Even the listings of the college's All-American atheletes did not include him. Pressure from students and faculty of the college brought about the lifting of this

On Saturday, October 7, 167 Ruby Doris Robinson (Former Executive Secretary of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee) passed away after 10 months of severe illness. Ruby Doris was born April 25, 1942 in Atlanta, Georgia to the Rev. and Mrs. James Smith, attended the Price High School and enrolled in Spelman College in 1960.

During her Freshman year she became involved in the struggle for

black liberation. Her activities included the following:

1. Working with the NAACP Youth Council as the Georgia

representative,
2 Active with the Atlanta Committee on Appeal for Human Rights (Atlanta Sudent Movement), Ruby, along with State Representative Julian Bond and others, organized the Atlanta Movement, and from that point on the remainder of her life was dedicated toward the liberation of her people.
3. In 1060 Ruby attended the

founding conference of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee in Raleigh, North Carolina. She was one of the original Freedom Riders to arrive in Jackson, Mississippi, and was jailed for 42 days in Parchman Penitentiary as a result of that ride sult of that ride.

4. Ruby was one of the first activists in the Sit-In Movement which resulted in a 32 day jail sentence in Rock Hill, South Carolina after demonstrating in February, 1961 charge: "Trespassing")

5. She was arrested on eight other occasions on charges stemming from various protest demonstrations and direct action tactics, which caused her to serve an additional 17 days in jail. -

6. As a full time staff member of SNCC. Ruby worked in Nashville, Tenn., McComb, Miss., Atlanta, Ga., Charleston, S.C., Albany, Ga. and many other areas. She has served as Personnel Officer, Southern Student Coordinator, and book-keeper for SNCC, as well as the administrator of the Sojourner Motor Fleet, which provides a pool of about 100 cars for movement workers in eight southern states.

After they are released, their families have no choice but to have them put away.

STUDENTS in the Rutgers School of Journalism initiated the campaign to nominate Robeson to the football Hall of Fame. The Student Council this spring voted 12-3 to support the effort. Earl Schenck Miers, prominent writer and former director of the Rutgers University Press, has supported Robeson's nomination, as has the local chapter of the Hall of Fame organization. The university administration, bowing to the growing pressure, last month placed Robeson's name in contention.

It is not his atheletic prowess, however, that primarily qualifies Paul Robeson as one of the most distinguished Americans of this century. He will be remembered finally as an outspoken fighter for racial justice and peace, and against colonialism and imperialism, as a courageous man who refuses to abandon his principles despite the vicious attacks which were leveled against him in this country.

letter man in sports at Rutgers, gave up a law career to become an internationally acclaimed stage and screen actor and singer.

His baritone voice was hailed by critics across the world. Perhaps his greatest critical success was his 1943 Broadway appearance in the title role of "Othello."

Despite his personal success, Robeson, throughout his career, spoke out continually against racial and political- injustice. Like many contemporary Negro artists and atheletes, including Muhammad Ali and others, Robeson refused to sell out his principled opposition to war and the subjugation of Black people in this country and throughout the

He supported and sang for the Loyalist forces fighting Franco's fascist army in the Spanish Civil War. He was a leader of the Civil Rights Congress, the militant civil rights organization of the 30's and 40's which was destroyed by the McCarthyite witchhunts. He was a leading figure in the 1948 Progressive Party campaign, and a supporter of many other peace, civil rights and progressive actions.

ROBESON was an early supporter of the national liberation movements in Africa and Asia, and severely criticized the U.S. for its failure to support the fight for freedom of colonial peoples.

Perhaps Robeson most inflamed the witchhunters with his continual and unqualified defense of the Communist Party's right to exist as a legitimate political body in America. In 1948 he told the Senate Judiciary Committee that the CPUSA was an important part of the progressive forces fighting for "complete equality of the Negro people in the United States."

As a prominent Black freedom

fighter, Robeson became a focal point for the wave of anti-Communist and racist hysteria generated as part of the cold-war policies of this country after World War II. He was questioned by the Congressional inquisitorial committees. Robeson declared he would go to jail rather than inform on his political associates.

ROBESON was blacklisted and effectively barred from American theater or film work. In cities where he had been hailed and honored he was barred from appearing in public buildings and halls. In an infamous incident in Peekskill, N. Y., in 1949, racist thugs attacked and injured scores of persons as they were leaving a Robeson concert.

Pressure generated from the sinister wedding of white supremacy and anti-Communism caused Robeson to leave the U.S. in the early 1950's. For the next 10 years he lived as a political exile in England and the socialist countries. In 1952 he received the Lenin Peace Prize awarded by the Soviet Union for "out-; standing service against warmongers and for the strengthening of peace." He returned to the U.S. in 1963.

A complicated process of elimination by screening committees, as well as balloting by members of the Hall of Fame organization, must be gone through before a candidate is actually placed in the Hall of Fame. But whatever the outcome of that process, Robeson will be recognized historically by the people of America and the world as a real "All-American" - athelete, scholar, artist, actor; and most importantly, militant battler for Negro freedom and against war.

Paul Robeson, now 69, suffered serious injuries in a fall in 1965 and currently resides in a rest home in Connecticut. \*\*

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
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

#### Puerto Ricans Fight Police

Three students received bullet wounds in a pitched battle with police in Puerto Rico Sept 27. One of the students, a girl is in critical condition.

More than 20 other students belonging to the Federation of University Students for Indepen-dence (FUPI) were injured when the police clubbed them and a civilian who was in sympathy with the students was killed by the police.

Twenty-one policemen were injured when the students hurled rocks, bottles and several Molotov cocktails against police cars.

The fight began when the police arrested six FUPI members who were scuffling with students belonging to the Pro-Statehood U-niversity Association (AUPE). The pro-independence students had gone to an AUPE meeting to protest the latter's accusation that the FUPI deals in drugs.
When police attacked the FUPI

demonstrators with clubs, the AUPE students supported the police by throwing bottles out of the windows of the building where they were meeting onto the rival-

# **Gubans Interview** RAP BROWN

Shortly after appearing at an INNER CITY VOICE rally here in Detroit, H. Rap Brown granted a telephone interview to a member of the Cuban Radio-broadcasting Institute in Havana. The text of the interview follows .:

Question: Hello, is this Mr. Rap

Brown: "Right. This is Rap Brown here.

Q: Well, Mr. Brown, we are talking to you in the name of the Cuban Radio-broadcasting Institute. We would like a brief recorded interview with you to offer your opinions to the Cuban radio audience. Are you willing to answer our questions?

Rap: "Right."

Q: Well, this is our first question.
Mr. Brown, does the struggle for black power have as its only objective the end of segregation or minish here; on the contrary, it does it also envision a program of new social structures in the United


Rap: "Right, when you talk about black power, you are talking about being able to control the future of the Negro population, which just as yesterday is sunk in total disaster today. America as it exists today cannot be said to be a country where Negroes also exist. Therefore, when we speak of changing society, the structure of society. and I do not think that it is an accident that every nation that becomes independent today adjusts itself to socialism of some type -- I think that black people who dare talk about systems say it has to be a socialistic nature."

Q: Well, here is your second question. Some sectors have been insisting lately, Mr. Brown, that violence is self-destructive for the Negroes in the United States. What opinion do you have on this state-

Rap: "That is not true. Black people are a propertyless people. We do not own property here. We are the property of America. We are a colony within America. Our rebellion has been against the structure in power, against white America, not against the black people. Understand that any deaths that occur are war casualties because we are at war. We cannot predict casualties However, look at it this way, black people died all the time when they were nonviolent. Black poeple have been dying all along in America Now they are beginning to avenge their dead. his is the essence of our redel lion that is going on over here in America now."

Some newspapers, mainly in the United States, have insisted that the present struggle by the Negroes will decrease in the coming mon-

Rap.: "The struggle, we know, will not decrease." Decrease is not only the way I understand it. Our people are fighting because of conditions. The people are lighting for liberation. The people are fighting for their freedom. There-



may become more intense. The people have legitimatized rebellion as a taticate. They are using it as a tactic. As you know about the war in Vietnam, the black people have adopted that method as a tactic in America. Each city in American which has large Negro population can predict with confidence that it will have rebellions because the black people are going to be free through any means necessary. We feel that our freedom here is linked to freedom throughout the world because America is the principal oppressor. America and its imperialist governments threaten the world with the blackmail of war. They threaten to declare war on the entire world. We do not acce t any war here, just as Cuba did not accept any war, the people of Vietnam have not accepted war, as the people of Guate-mala have not accepted war."

Q: Mr. Brown, do you believe that the struggle which began this summer could bring to the North American Negroes some gains, and, if this is so, do you think that these should be enough to end the present movement?

Rap: "The struggle did not just be-jin this summer. It has been a struggle all along. It accelerated this summer. Black people really became disillusioned with America long-ago. Now they have become convinced that it is hopeless to sit back and wait for America to change. America has no intention of changing. The struggle we encounter today is not a new struggle. "It has accelerated and is a more advanced struggle now."

Q: Can you offer us, Mr. Brown, any new information or confirmation about discrimination by the Pentagon in sending Negro soldiers, rather than whites, to certain fighting fronts in Vietnam? Rap: "Right. Now that is an attempt, that is an active type of genocide. Genocide is being committed in America against black people. It is no accident that "30 percent of the casualties in Vietnam are black men and that 22 percent of the forces there are black.

## OUR BROTHERS IN AMERICA FROM THE VIETNAMESE COURRIER

After Viet Nam, come Detroit, Newark, Buffalo, Los Angeles, Milwaukee, Washington: the crash of guns resounds in American cities, shaken by the rumble of tanks Men die, whose only crime is to be born with a black skin.

There is a so-called Negro problem in the United States. For us Vietamese, there is much more than a Negro problem, an abstract "problem" among the thousands that beset our times. A Negro who falls in the United States under the bullets of policemen and racists makes us seethe with anger, and tears come to our eyes. The murder of a Negro child tears our bowels. The crash of guns in Det-roit, and the rumble of tanks in the Black Ghettoes of America echo deeply in our hearts.

That great anger which ex plodes, those Negro quarters rising up in a heroic struggle those men, women, children standing up to Yankee soldiers and police with bottles, bricks, shotguns, infuse grea emotion and enthusiasm into our hearts. When American Negroes rise up to defend their freedom, they also defend our freedom, and the freedom of all in this world.

The heroic fight of the American Negroes is also our fight. It is the same men, the Johnsons, the McNamaras, Dean Rusks, the big Yankee trusts, the generals and politicians in the service of big companies, who are clamouring for the war in Viet Nam and for repression against the Black Ghettoes. It is the same men, members of the Ku Klux Klan, of the John Birch Society and others, Bull Connor and his accomplices, who are the worst "hawks" concerning Viet Nam. Those who exploit, humiliate, lynch Negroes in the United States are the same who want to reduce the Vietnamese people to serfdom, who have tried to pen them up in "strategic hamlets" and quell their will for independ-ence with napalm, phosphorus bombs and poison gas.
The American Negroes' hero-

ic struggle, their calvary all along the centuries, the successive stages of their fierce fight have gradually been engraved upon the conscience of the Vietnamese. Nearly 50 years ago, when the Vietnamese people still didn't know where the U.S.A. was, Mguyen Ai Quoc (now President Ho Chi Minh) already wrote pages seething with anger against the K,K,K. Nearer our time, when Negro children were molested at Little Rock, when at Birminam police dogs tore the flesh of Negro demonstrators, we knew, we felt that it was the fate of our own children which was at stake, that it was our own flesh that the dogs were lacerating. Even the distress of a Negro who tires desparately to straighten his hair or vents his sorrow in a mournful spiritual is felt by us as our own distress. And when a Negro orator praises before the United Nations or the American Congress the "kindness" of the U.S. adminstration, this affects us as much as if that renegade were betraying ourselves.

When the hard necessities of war bring face to face a Vietnamese fighter and an American Negro, tragedy breaks out in the former's conscience: Is the other man a brother or a foe? We know that he is a brother, for he and his people have been exploited and oppressed, beaten up and lynched all along the centuries by the same men who now send him to die in Viet Nam. He had perhaps wandered in Harlem, out of a job, until

"Black and white together, black and white together, we shall overcome someday." This song, as well as "sock it to me Black Power," and "I just want to testify what the white man has done to me," have been heard every night for the last 54 straight nights. You can hear it as black and white pevple stand side by side in St Boniface Church in Milwaukee for a rally, or as they walk on the streets, after

Lately, civil rights in Ameri a, has become more anti-white and militant. Milwaukee must seem to be rather behind the times, with its integrated, relatively nonvio-lent protests Infact, some nation-al Black Power figures have refused to join the protest here, for that reason

The perpetuator of the Open Housing demonstrations here in Milwaukee, is the youth coucil of the NAACP. It is mostly composed of young, black people, but there are white members too. And, of

ourse, as peo le all across the country have learned, the advisor is a white priest, Father James Groppi. White or black, there is no doubt as to the devotion, trust, and love these young people have for the priest. Also, the Youth Council, even though militant and certainly Black Power orientated, have welcomed white participa-

These things have attracted white students, clergymen and the rally, in an Open Housing March nuns, and housewives to th marches and rallies. Some feel that Milwaukee's protests are the last hope for blacks and whites working together in civil rights. They feel if this integration and nonviolent approach fails, frustrated negros will turn more and more to violence and black nationalism

The new Negro militants do not want integration and they call for goals of unification, economic and political power, and more self-determination. Now, even though whites are involved, the NAACP Youth Council makes sure that the leadership is in the hands of the black people. But, most of them

will tell you that the idea of excluding whites from participation just will not work, as whites hold the balance of political and economic power, and to make Black Power a reality, it will take white

Seeing the white students and clergymen participate in the demonstrations here reminds one of the civil rights campaigns in the South several years ago, except that the whites do not have the positions of leadership that they had

The civil rights movement in Milwaukee can be looked at as behind the rest of the country, or as having bypassed an anti-white phase, and therefore ahead of many places. But, even though the movement in Milwaukee clings to old ways of nonviolence and not rejecting whites, its ways are progressive in being oriented towards Black Power, and Black self-determination in this struggle for racial justice. \* \*

#### TO REASON WHY

A common front for all black peo le is the goal of every black organization and group in the black revolution. But every effort to achieve this unity, violent and non-violent, organized and disorganized, has been frustrated, largely by means of the common mass media that unwisely opposes the non-violent and organized strategies.

For example, if a non-violent leader opposes the war in Vietnam he is disowned for being an unpatriotic meddler. He wasn't acceptable in the first place and his opposition gave the supposedly responsible Establishment the excuse it so fervently sought to deineffectual, except when he complied with their disposition, right

On the other hand, men like But we are getting together. Stokely and Rap, who preach self-defense, which includes the dislonating of ravenous exploiters reasons to unite become carre denounced for having run out. are denounced for having run out of patience with the Establishment that reneges on its promises and shows a feebly disguised contempt for the wishes of black people.

So, the common front seems as far away from achievement as it ever did. But it is not. We are uniting because we are all trying, and are coming together in a way that is as natural as water mixing with itself. More and more we are becoming proud of our blackness and achievements.

Black people greet each other as strangers with genuine warmth, now, and see beauty and a cause to love, where before we saw shame and a cause to hate. The only requirement for membership is that which has been our ignominy, our any shade of dark skin, our most of the time kinky hair, and our own distinctive speechusages.

However, we've still got a long way to go. For there are as many ideologies as there are many shades of our blackness, so there must be a unifying thing coming out of the differing ideologies. This unifying thing will re- some roots are, one of Wilt's team

#### Atrocities A **Black Woman Witnessed**

On the first day of Detroit's Rebellion, twelve to sixteen policemen, forced their way into my home and arrested me on charges of assault with intent to murder after confiscating two guns that had not been fired in two months.

I was taken to the Tenth Pre-cinct on Livernois and Elmhurst and placed in a dirty cell with sixteen other women with whom I took turns lying on the two wooden boards provided for us to sleep

Our dinner consisted of unwrapped bologna sandwichs distributed in a cardboard box by an

officer with dirty hands. When I refused to accept a sandwich, the officer became abusive and said that "the animals, like us, shouldn't be fed at all." Other, more obscene officers, indicated that there were "certain ways" that female prisoners could get better treatment.

I talked with several of the women there. Some had been picked up for violating curfew and had been denied permission to notify anyone of their whereabouts. Another woman was humiliated in the station when the officers deliber-ately snatched off her wig and then kicked her about the body

Once, while the police guards were standing around flirting, one girl asked if they would get her a drink of water. The guard took a cup, urinated in it, and passed it through the bars.

All during the night, men prisoners were taken into rooms and beaten It seemed the louder they yelled, the more they were beaten. We were able to look through the bars and see the condition of the men as they left the rooms. One man's back was covered with blood; another had been beaten in the face. and blood ran from the mouth of one prisoner where his teeth had been broken out. After this, I was threatened with bodily harm if I were caught looking out at the men prisoners again.

I noticed that on all the male prisoners, the zipper front on their pants were ripped apart. I later found out that as the men were arrested, the police took the butt end of their rifles and rammed them into the prisoners private parts

A girl I went to school with was brought in on Friday. #### THE FORD SETTLEMENT

Everywhere we turn in the papers, daily and union, we see the gains of the settlement for the Ford workers, a settlement which will be the pattern for all auto. Yet what is not mentioned are the things that were given up for this "great" package and the things that should have been gotten and were not. There were two main aspects that were "gained": 1) the pay increase and 2) the supplemental unemployment benefits. The pay package was good but what was given up for it was a very important principal: now there is a ceiling on the cost of living clause: 8 cent a year to be adjusted at the end of the year instead of quarterly. This means that the union gave away a basic protection from the increasingly rampart inflation which is gripping this coun-

The great "protection" that the SUB improvement of ers for workers who are laid off is a fraud. It does provide for close to 95% of the total wages for a worker for up to one year However there is a gimmick. To receive such increased benefits, a worker must have at least seven years senior-ity. The majority of UAW members do not have seven years seniority and before any real number of auto workers receive benefits from such an agreement there would have to be a depression the like of which this country has not seen for thirty years. Further, this part of the package is being paid for with the elimination of he Christmas bonus for workers. stayed in the house not letting her touch anything until they obtained a search warrent. The police agter bringing the search waraant then proceeded too pack books into boxes and seized everything they thought they could use for their big conspiracy.

He told my wife that this was the day he has been waiting for ... "This is my day". 



## HOUSE OF BONDAGE

Thomas Waters

Ernest Kole, a native of South Africa and the author of the new book "House of Bondage" was in Detroit last week as a part of a nation-wide tour. He is unimpressed with the level of so called "freedom" which Blacks enjoy, more accurately, do not enjoy in

He points out that the major oppressing force in both cases is the same. "The American public and the government are supposedly opposed to the poli y of apartheid (racial segregation), yet they support in coments of more than \$700 million in South Africa." he

"The profits of American in-dustrialists in South Africa are their greatest in the world, be-cause they depend on exploitation of African workers who are for-bidden to strike."
"While the American govern-

ment has condemned apartheid in the United Nations, and other forums, they condemn it in principle and su port it in practice."

Kole had figures to show that among the greatest American investors in South Africa are General Motors, Ford, Chrysler, Westinghouse, Co.a-Cola and the Chase Manhatten Bank.

These are the same concerns which dominate to a large extent the American domestic economy.



Observers tend to link these attacks and fores with the actions : and threats of extreme right wing groups. These groups have made it known that they are arming themselves against black people, and are promising that they will use their guns to make the blood of black people flow in the streets of Detroit.

#### **England** Tries Muslim

READING, England, Oct. 17—Michael X, the firebrand leader of British Black Muslims, went on trial here today on a charge of inciting racial hatred.

Formerly known as Michael de Freitas, he adopted the Moslem faith and the pseudonym Michael X, and legaly changed his name to Michael Abdul Malik after he met the late American Black Muslim leader Malcolm X three years ago. He is an immigrant from Trinidad, son of a white father and colored mother, who start-ed his working life as a sea-

man.

After a noisy day in court during which he argued with the presiding judge and court attendants, laughed, joked and waved to his friends in the public gallery, Malik was re-fused bail.

Wearing a white mandarin shirt under a navy blue suit and a yellow "Black Power" badge in his lapel, Malik, bearded and bushy-haired, arrived in court with a group of followers.

#### Waves to the Gallery

As he was directed to a large raised enclosure in the center of the courtroom, Malik waved to the gallery. "Come along," said a police officer. "Don't fuss," replied Malik. In the dock he turned angrily to a prison officer: "move you goddam hand," he said. "Stop pushing me around."

B. C. Hutton, the gray-wigged judge, called the Recorder in this court, intervened sternly: "Be guiet — you understand raised enclosure in the center

"Be quiet — you understand me?"

Malik replied: "You understand me, brother."

After a young woman who shouted encouragement from the gallery was removed by the police, the Recorder warned that anyone else creating a dis-

turbance would be ejected.
"Me, too?" asked Malik. That
brought laughs from the gal-

The Recorder urged Malik, who is conducting his own defense, to speak up if he had any questions.

son in this country to be tried under Section 6 of the Race Relations Act of 1965, which makes it a crime to incite racial hatred.

Kenneth Jones, the prosecutor, charged that at a public meeting in the Rainbow Hall of Reading on July 24, Malik had delivered a speech on two

themes. First, Mr. Jones said, the speech was an attack on white speech was an attack on white people generally, contending that they were vicious and nasty, that they were soulless, that they were savages and that they were degrading and conversing black recole oppressing black people.

Second, he charged, Malik's speech was an exhortation to black people to ignore the laws of Britain, to inspire terror among whites, to use violence against them and even to shoot, kick and, if necessary, kill them.

No one man epitomized the international ramifications of the struggles for freedom as does Che Guevarra, for Che belonged to no single nation or people. He was one of the first of an increasingly sigtrue international revolutionary.

Che was born 39 years ago men actively and violently engaged in Argentina, where he received in revolutionary guerilla warfare his formal and early political edagainst oligarchic national oppres- neation acquiring a medical deagainst oligarchic national oppres- ucation, acquiring a medical desors, and International American gree and a thorough hatred for

exploitation and oppression.

In the early 1950's, he left Argentina and launched his career as a professional revolutionist. He was an active supporter of the reformist Arbenz government of Guatemala, which was overthrown by the United States Marines in 1952. His rofession led him to Mexico. There in 1955, he joined exiled Cuban revolutionaries who were planning a campaign of guerilla warfareon the island. The exiles were trained by Gemeral Alberto Bayo, who had fought with the Republican forces in the Spanish Civil War. Fidel Castro, released from Batista's prison along with his beather. Bould in Mar. with his brother Raul, in May, 1955, was part of the core of the exile group. On Sunday, December 1, 1956, Fidel, Che, Raul, and Camillo Cienfuegos, landed on Cuba with a force of about 80

force, survived, and one of their most heroic, and most capable leaders was Che Guevara. In the Cuban mountains he often risked his life serving a dangerous revolutionary mission. After four years of armed struggle, the Revolutionary Army was strong enough

and the guerillas, and the urban underground revolutionaries came to power in Havana.

For the next few years, Che served the Cuban people and their government in stabilizing the Cunificant political force; he was a ban revolution and economy in the face of massive pressure and constant harassment and assaults from the U.S. But in 1965, Che gave up his government position, and his Cuban citizenship, and returned to his first duty as an international revolutionist. Over the past two years, we can only speculate as to where Che had gone, and what he had done.

It was in Bolivia, that he established a new revolutionary front, this year. In the earlier part of 1967, Regis Debray, the French journalist, traveled into the Bolivian jungle to become the first, and apparently the only journalist to interview Guevara, in recent years. The Bolivian government arrested Debray several months ago and charged him with subversion. His interview has yet to be published.

The war between the guerillas and the army flared the past few months, with brilliant initial successes for the revolutionaries. But the area of Bolivia which the guerillas operated in, was too sparsely populated to afford on Cuba with a force of about the protection which a popular guerillas. mation to the Bolivian army, where upon the reactionaries deployed 1,500 men to the area in which Che was moving The government troops encountered Che's small band of guerillas and a four hour battle ensued. Che was wounded and captured in the battle. The next day, he was shot and killed murdered - by the Bolivian government.

Apparently, the Bolivian government felt that by killing Che, they would halt the revolutions. But Che himself had repeatedly stated, "One cannot export rev-olutions. Revolutions develop out of indigenous conditions. They explode naturally wherever one group of men oppress and exploit another."

Murdering Che, does not murder the revolution, but inflames it. Che was not a man who carried a match and ignited revolutions anymore than Rap Brown ignites riots. Che acted according to the conditions prevailing. And those conditions have prevail ed and instigated revolts long before Che was ever born.

So it is that Che, the international ist, was a product of the bestiality of the western world, just as all of us are.

So it is that Che knew he was waging a life or death struggle with the oppressor. And so must we understand that we ar fighting that same battle. As Che understood that the revolution is international in scope, and that any serious revolutionary must develop an international field of activity, to defeat the international monolith that white America controls, so we of Black America must develop the one struggle for nationalism and selfdetermination into an international revolutionary struggle against racist Imperialist, white America. Viva Che.

When I went to see the African Ballet at the Fisher Theatre, I cursed every white man and his descendants who ever took a black person from the shores of Africa by force, and every white man and his descendants who bought and kept those people in bondage.
The performers on stage looked

like the black people seen in the audience, on 12th Street, born or raised in ---you name it. They shouted, moved their shoulders, heads, arms, feet, and bodies exactly like black people. Here was, I am you, that I could understand in sound, sight, and symbols that I couldn't understand.


One thing became gradually clearer soon after the curtain went up on the first vignette The people we were learning about in a language we couldn't understand have a respect for moral principles to a breath taking degree. If their courtships are beautifully tender, and sex sacred, their pun-ishment for offenders is severe and turbulent to male and temale. A sharp contrast to life as we know it, where hardly anything morally reprehensible, and attractive wo-men, brought to trial, are often acquired before they are tried.

Then, there was the prostrate form of a maiden, dead of grief, who became the immediate concern of the first passerby. Like nothing in the scenes of our society, especially the big cities This culture that is so charming and magnificent gave me a brief nostalgic glimpse of itself for one swift night. How many prostrate forms will be ignored for how long, today, here in America? Maybe tribal life is the best way.

Another emotion was aroused at the thought of American impudence brought to vivid portrayal on TV, where the latest ridiculous offering has the white man in this country with so few frontiers to conquer taking his cowboy tactics to Africa, where if history is a criterion, he will wrest the entire continent from the natives, kill most of them, put the rest on re-servations and claim the country as his, discovered by David Livingston, who by that time will have been employed by the CIA, Actually, the white man has no place in that society, just as he had no place in the society of what we call the American Indian. But watch

him. He will purchase the land with cunning, and say, "keep the society. We will exploit the wealth"

The dancing was not just good it was exciting, and these Africans were showing a joy that overflows from a simple way of life in a people who are at peace and have time to dance and rejoice.

We've never had a time for dancing, even the our songs and dances have helped make the American culture what it is today. When the slaveowners forbade our fore-parents to keep their culture alive and took away all our other rights, our time for singing and dancing went too. We have less time now, to sing and dance like the black people in that African group. But, when we do, we have the same exciting drive and freedom that black people will always have regardless of time and geography.

When the performance ended, the applause was long and sustained. But few rose to their feet to acclaim that thrilling spectacle, and I wondered if every white man in the audience was cursing ancestry, self and children, also, and was too ashamed to stand.

They plan to whip up a campaign to destroy the extremists then those close to the extremists, then anyone who disagrees with them. This is how. Hitler came to power in Germany and exterminated the Jews. These forces plan to unleash mass terror against the Negro Community in the year 1969. 


