
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

ARE WE THIRSTING FOR SLAUGHTER?

It appear that we must go to war with Germany. The freedom in all the principal industries of the land. of the seas, they tell us, has been denied us and we must therefore rush into the European war and have hundreds of thousands of

human beings sacrificed to wanton slaughter.

The people of the United States and the people of Germany have not the slightest grievance against one another. Left to themselves they would be on terms of perfect amity and peace. They would not dream of flying at one another's throats and tearing at one another's vitals like wild beasts. It is not the people but the ruling class of the United States and Germany that want the war and they want it for purposes entirely their own. The people of both countries have everything to lose, including their lives, and absolutely nothing to gain by such a war.

We are opposed to plunging this nation into the European slaughter. Every workingman should cry out against this un-

speakable crime.

The false cry of "patriotism" and "preparedness" and "defense of the flag" and "honor of the nation" should not deceive anyone not feeble-minded. Patriotism for their own profit is the real shibboleth of the capitalist class. They want war to serve their own ends and they declare it at their own sweet will. But they do not rush to the front themselves and have their own bodies shot into bloody tatters. They remain safely in the rear enjoying their lux- tion. uries and egging on their slaves as they slaughter one another without knowing why.

Let every workingman and every other man who abhors war and slaughter raise his voice in protest against the threatened war with Germany. There is absolutely no excuse for it. The working

people will furnish the great bulk of its victims.

If the miserable pretext that is urged for hostilities is permitted to serve its satanic purpose and war is declared it will be not only the costliest war this country ever waged in respect to blood and treasure, but it will be to the eternal disgrace of the United States.

When the plutocrats who own the country are in the front ranks of the army raised to wage war it will be time enough for their wage-slaves to bring up the rear.

The patriotism of the ruling class is spelled p-r-o-f-i-t-s.

PROSPERITY_AND STRIKES

It should appear curious to those who do not study economic causes and effects that the more prosperous a country is under the capitalist system the more discontented are the working-class who produce that prosperity. This is an anomoly indeed and yet to the student of economics there is nothing strange about it.

The reports of the United States Bureau of Labor show that during the first nine months of the year 1915 there were 916 strikes and lockouts and that during the first nine months of the year 1916

the number had increased to 2,584.

The prosperity of 1916, if such it can ever be truly called in the present system, was far greater than that of 1915 and in fact greater by far than ever before in the history of the country. This abnormal state of affairs was of course produced by the European war. The exports from this country to foreign markets for 1916 aggregated more than seven billion dollars, or an average of more than five hundred million dollars per month.

> In the year 1916, by far the most prosperous in the history of the country, there were nearly three times as many strikes and lockouts as there were in the preceding year of 1915, when prosperity was just getting its start and the wage increases had not yet taken place nor the cost of living mounted to the incredible alti-

tude which it now occupies.

All of which simply means that prosperity for the workingclass is a fraud, a delusion and a false pretense under the capitalist system. The real prosperity is exclusively enjoyed by the capitalist class who pocket the swelling profits while the workers continue at their slavish tasks for shelter and shoddy and provender enough to feed their labor power and keep it alive.

Socialism, the collective ownership of industry and production for the benefit of the workers will bring real prosperity to the country and bring it for all who are willing to do their share to earn

forgets his own petty troubles.

And such is the Socialist and hence the joy with which he serves the cause, the loyalty with which he fights for its principles, and

the devotion with which he clings to its ideals.

If the most sordid plutocrat could feel for once the thrill of joy the Socialist feels in clasping hands with a comrade and in giving himself body and soul to the cause he would realize that all his private possessions in the means of life are trash so far as being fruitful of any real happiness to him is concerned, and he would no longer wonder why Socialists feel themselves infinitely more richly rewarded for the service they render their cause than the exploiters possibly can in harvesting the dollars that are drained from the veins of their hapless victims.

MOONEY'S OUTRAGEOUS CONVICTION

The capitalist jury in San Francisco brought in the verdict expected of it in the case of Thomas J. Mooney, who was falsely charged with having been responsible for the bomb explosion in

The prosecution, backed by the manufacturers and big business men, succeeded in convicting Mooney upon false and trumpedup charges and sentencing him to prison for life. The conviction and sentence are infamous beyond expression. Every fair-minded person who attended the trial is convinced of the absolute innocence of Mooney and his indicted associates, which include his

The truth is that Mooney and his wife and comrades have been active, offensively active in fighting the battles of the working-class on the Pacific coast. They were not of the pure and simple craft union species, but real unionists who stood for the industrial organization of the workers, and they have long been a thorn in the flesh of the capitalist union-wreckers in California.

For this reason and no other they were marked for vengeance and the explosion of the bomb in the preparedness parade was the signal for their arrest and for lining up the filthy prostitutes of al-

leged witnesses to swear them into life sentences in prison.

At this writing a motion is pending for a new trial. This may or may not be granted. Probably not. We have absolutely no faith in capitalist courts. We know how they are ruled, how they are controlled, and to what end. For cold-blooded justice, for sheer infamy, and for downright prostitution to the basest ends commend us to the courts of capitalism. We know them.

But whether a new trial is granted or not we must stand by Tom Mooney and his brave wife and their comrades. They have stood staunchly for the working class and we can do no less than to stand by them to the last. Their conviction is an outrage that should make the blood boil in every workingman's veins. It is a pity, yes, a thousand pities, that the labor movement does not realize that this conviction is a deadly attack upon itself.

TO THE AMERICAN PEOPLE:

By a mere executive decree, the president of our country has broken off diplomatic relations with the German empire, and placed the people of the United States in imminent danger of being actively

drawn into the mad war of Europe.

During the last thirty months, the blackest months in the annals of human history, six million innocent men have been brutally killed, and many more millions have been crippled and maimed! for life. Whole countries have been devastated and the accumulated treasures of human industry and nature's generosity have been ruthlessly destroyed.

Europe is a dread house of mourning in which disconsolate sobs of the widows and orphans at home mingle with the agonized

groans of the wounded and dying on the battlefields.

In this savage carnival of wholesale and indiscriminate murder, there was but one powerful member of the family of nations that preserved an attitude of comparative sanity—the United States of America. Removed by the vast stretch of the Atlantic ocean from the scene of the inhuman conflict, safe in our economic self-sufficiency and proud of our advanced and democratic institutions, we watched the self-destruction of our European brothers with bleeding hearts, eagerly waiting for the opportunity to bring them back to reason and peace, to life and happiness.

And, suddenly, with little notice or warning, without the sanction or consent of the people and without consultation with the people's chosen representatives in Congress, we are practically ordered to join the mad dance of death and destruction and to swell the ghastly river of blood in Europe with the blood of thousands

of American workers.

The Socialist party of the United States, speaking in behalf of thousands of its adherents, and in behalf of the working class of the country, enters a solemn protest against this wanton attempt to draw us into the European conflict.

We are opposed to wars between nations, because war is a reversion to brutal barbarism. We are opposed to the present threatened war in particular, because no great war has ever been waged with less justification and on more frivolous pretexts.

The policy of unrestricted and indiscriminate submarine warfare recently announced by the German government is most ruthless and inhuman, but so is war as a whole and so are all methods applied by both sides. War is murder. War is the climax of utter lawlessness, and it is idle to prate about lawful or lawless methods

of warfare.

The German submarine warfare does not threaten our national integrity or independence, not even our national dignity and honor. It was not aimed primarily at the United States and would not affect the American people. It would strike only those parasitic classes that have been making huge profits by manufacturing instruments of death or by taking away our food and selling it at exorbitant prices to the fighting armies of Europe.

The workers of the United States have no reason and no desire to shed their blood for the protection and furtherance of the unholy profits of their masters, and will not permit a lying and venal press to stampede them into taking up arms to murder their brothers

The six million men whose corpses are now rotting upon the battlefields of Europe were mostly workingmen. If the United States is drawn into war, it will be the American workers whose lives will be sacrificed—an inglorious, senseless sacrifice on the altar of capitalist greed.

Workers of America, awaken! The hour is grave; the danger is imminent; silence would be fatal! Gather the masses in meetings and demonstrations. Speak in unmistakable tones. Let your determined protest resound from one end of the country to the

Send telegrams or letters to President Wilson, to the United States senators and congressmen. Demand that American citizens and American ships be forbidden to enter the war zone, except at their own risk. Insist that the nation shall not be plunged into war for the benefit of plundering capitalists.

Down with war! Down with the inhuman social system that breeds war! Long live peace! Long live the international soli-

darity of the workers of all nations!

To the American citizen living far from New York and from the national capital it is difficult to conceive of the pressure that is being brought to bear upon everyone in official life in Washington to advance the war propaganda. It is a pressure that finds the oligarchy of millionaires who have its way through professional, business, social, educational and religious chan-nels. It is bluntly expressed in the speeches of government officials. It is whispered in reception halls and at the theatre, it dictates the music at fashionable concerts, it insinuates itself into the farm bulletins, the labor reports, the trade union meetings, the mercantile advertisements and the public prayers of the clergy. Of course it poisons the headlines, molds the phrases and designs the policy of the four daily newspapers in Washington and the chief newspapers of Eastern cities that are read here.

Congressman Callaway of Texas, startled the House some days ago by putting into the Congressional Record, pages 3320-3321, the follow-

ing quoted statement:
"In March, 1915, the J. P. Morgan interests, the steel, ship-building and powder interests and their subsidiary organizations, got together 12 men high up in the newspaper world and employed them to select the most influential newspapers in the United States and sufficient number of them to control generally the policy of the daily press of the United States.

"These 12 men worked the problem out by selecting 179 newspapers, and then began by an elimination process to retain only those necessary for the purpose of controlling the general policy of the daily press throughout the country. They found it was only necessary to purchase the control of 25 of the greatest papers. The trol of 25 of the greatest papers. The ling \$100 to \$500 a month. Address nearest office. 25 papers were agreed upon; emissaries Dept. B-53 National Salesmen's Training Ass'n, Chicago, New York, San Francisco. were sent to purchase the policy, national and international, of these papers; an agreement was reached; the policy of the papers was bought, to be paid for by the month; an editor was furnished for each paper to properly supervise and edit information regarding the questions of preparedness, militarism, financial policies and other things of a national and international nature considered vital to the interests of the purchasers.

"This contract is in existence at the present time, and it accounts for the news columns of the daily press of the country being filled with all sorts of preparedness arguments and misrepresentations as to the present condition of the United States army and navy, and the possibility and probability of the United States being attacked by foreign foes.

"This policy included also the suppression of everything in opposition to the wishes of the interests served. The effectiveness of this scheme has been conclusively demonstrated by the character of stuff carried in the daily press of the country since March, 1915. They have resorted to anything necessary to commercialize public sentiment and sandbag the National Congress into making extravagant and Mo.

drafted a bill which calls for the drafting of every boy, at 19 years of age, into six months' military service, under pretense that this is "training." A similar bill has been favorably reported from the Senate Committee on Military Affairs.

While the appropriation of \$660,000,-000 for "preparedness" last year was considered to be far beyond any total for military and naval expenditures to be asked in future, it is now certain that the appropriation for war preparations this year will be near \$800,000,000. The naval appropriation bill as it passed the House called for \$368,000,-000, the fortifications bill added \$60,-000,000, and the army appropriation bill, reported from the House Committee at \$247,000,000, will probably be near \$375,000,000 when it goes to the President. Between the time of report to the House and final passage by Congress last year, the army appropriation was increased by \$110,000,-

Petitions and remonstrances against war, sent to members by their constituents, are in may cases being suppressed. One congressman has received a hundred such protests against the proposed declaration of war against Germany, and has refused to file any of them with Congress. The right of petition, unless backed up by personal appearance in Washington, has been largely ignored through the influence of the insidious war-lobby.

A trainload of members of the Emergency Peace Foundation, four-fifths of them Socialists, came to Washington from New York and other cities on Feb. 12, and presented resolutions of protest against war with any European power, at the capitol and at the White House. The "kept" press attempted to ignore their coming, and various jingo politicians in Congress sneered at them. Two local papers published editorials ridiculing the idea that the opponents of war had a right to a respectful hearing from their public servants.

A German newspaper correspondent sent to Germany a dispatch which led to the offer of the German government, on Feb. 10, to talk over its dispute with the United States with a view to avoiding war. This correspondent was at once forbidden the right of the press to interview the Secretary of State, and was given a safe-conduct back to Germany. The war party at once raised a loud cry that it was "criminal" for this man to inform the German people that a large part of the American public is today opposed to war.

Seventeen bills aimed at restricting civil liberty in this country, under pretense of safeguarding the nation against spies and other enemies, have been combined into one blanket bill, and reported favorably from a Senate committee. Under one clause of this bill any person who shall in time of war or military emergency collect or convey information regarding almost any subject connected with the number, location or "condition" of the national forces, or of the resources at their disposal, may be punished at the discretion of the President. Three years' imprisonment and \$10,000 fine are the penalties laid down for violation of whatever rules the President may announce, as to what shall be said or printed regarding these mat-ters. The bill virtually appoints the President as absolute dictator of the nation, and empowers him to punish anyone who may say anything of which he may disapprove.

A bill providing for seizure of factories and ship-yards, and for con-scription of the workers in these plants, in time of military emergency, and for the waiving of the eight-hour laws and other industrial safeguards, and actually forbidding the suggestion or encouragement of the quitting of work by any employe on government work, whether in a contract or a gove ernment shop, was drafted in the Attorney General's office and sent to Congress, on the day following the dismissal of the German ambassador.



And all the retinue of priests, that say their God ordains The crown that rests upon the brow of every brute that reigns-Let these go, too, and take their myths, their goblins and their hell, And give this tortured world of ours a longed for breathing spell!

One peasant lad that plows the field where grows the golden corn, Is nobler breed than all the whelps that wolves of war have borne; One song sung by some genial soul, along some sheltered glade, Shall hush some day the savage shock that madmen's guns have made; One gleam of love that suckling babe in mother's eyes beheld, Shall silence all the threats of doom that insane priests have yelled; One word of brotherhood and peace—one breath from fragrant flowers— These be the only things of worth, in this old world of ours!

Speeches by Senators Works and Lane

SENATOR WORKS

Any American citizen who would go to Europe and walk down between the trenches where they were firing at one another with their machine guns would be an ass, and would deserve to get just what he would get. I would not fight for him. No, I would not take any chance of being shot for him. That kind of a citizen is of no value or credit to us; that is, he puts this Nation in peril and does not bring anything of value in return to this country after having been nurtured in it to the age of maturity, an age when he ought in ordinary decency to help keep out of trouble by using a reasonable amount of common sense. So I would say to him when he starts for the war zone: "My dear brother, we bid you farewell; you may go there if you want; you can tramp up and down all your life between the firing lines; but I do not assume any responsibility for your happiness or good health, It is right up to you."

After a nation has fought bravely and well as have the others and for what it considers to be as just a cause and for as high ideals as its enemies, and it should come and say to me that there is a certain zone about my enemies' country inside of which no ship will be permitted to pass with ammunition or food, I would say to him: "Very well, that suits me first-rate. I live more than 3,000 miles away from you and our people at home need all the food we have and more than they get and it looks like we might need our ammunition after a while in order to rehabilitate ourselves from a peace footing to one of reasonable war preparation in the event that some other nation may come to dislike us. It is up to you gentlemen. I will keep my ships at home."

There is many a family in this country today, gentlemen, who under the high cost of living, due in part to the war, are not getting quite enough to eat. Right here within five blocks of this buliding where I am talking, or not to exceed ten squares, and all over the country there are families that are cutting down on their food supply for lack of money with which to pay for it. Our first duty is to them. Prices of food have gone up so high that no

quality, and children begin to suffer here at home, all due in a degree and indirectly to this great and unfortunate conflict which is going on upon the other side of the ocean, and I have no

heart in it or for it.

I would say to the people of this country or to the gentlemen who want to ship merchandise or other articles of value for profit for the support of these other people, that our people also need them, and it may be that they need them as badly as do the people over there. In England the price of bread is said to be cheaper than it is in this country for the reason that they have cheaper wheat than we have, because they bought it from us when the the market was lower. Our first duty lies here; and our people both need and want bread. They are our people, and they are those of our people who will have to fight if we become entangled in your embroilment. Our first duty is to them.

I would say to those who want to go across the dead line, where there are submarines or Zeppelins that drop bombs, "Go, and God go with you; but go at your own risk. I will not fight to save the merchandise of any such American citizens as you are. Go and get killed if you want to, but we, the people, will not fight for you, or the like of you, or for your cargoes of war supplies.'

Mr. President, can we be justified, will we ever be excused by future generations for taking this course, involving with unerring certainty the fearful consequences that must inevitably follow it?. Can we in the years to come satisfy our own consciences that by such a course we, as the responsible representatives of this country, are serving the best interests of the peaceloving people of a free Republic or of humanity?

The President has made the first fatal move. The next step that will plunge our people into a bloody conflict, if taken, must be ours. Congress alone has the power under our Government to declare war. "The Morning After"

One of the characteristic headaches due to uric acid in the system, which acts as a poison when it accumulates, is due to alcohol taken the night before. 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hending what must follow, would sense of courage or national prestige applaud Congress if it should at once or dignity. declare war against Germany. The public mind has been prepared for such a mad course by the unseemly and unpatriotic propaganda in favor of pre-paredness for war. The war spirit, the desire for conflict, have been insidiously instilled into the minds of our people by this selfish agitation in favor of preparedness for the shedding of human blood. Preparedness for means of making that condition of mental preparedness effective. The minds of the people were made ready to accept and applaud an act that means war. The act of the President that is expected to lead to this result has been accepted by the public mind thus falsely educated and inspired. Mentally the good, peace loving people of the Nation have by this means been led astray from the paths of peace and made ready to accept the prospect of physical warfare with rejoicing. The act of the President to such a distorted mind is accepted as courageous, even heroic. And, Mr. President, this is looked upon in this time, when most of the world is convulsed with war, as an act of patriotism.

Now, Mr, President, let us stop a moment to look this appalling situation squarely in the face, consider whether we are leading this Nation and why, and ask ourselves whether or not we are justified in the course so far entered upon and in carrying it out to its legitimate and fearful consequences. Now is the time to take counsel with ourselves and our consciences. Very soon it may be too late. War once entered upon, however much we may desire it, we cannot draw back. The Nation once at war must and will receive our earnest, loyal and undivided support. Have we the moral courage to do the things now that will avoid the war? To avoid it now may call for a higher degree of courage and real and unalloyed patriotism than to enter upon it or even pursue it to the end. If ever true and unselfish patriotism and the highest standard of moral courage, courage far more important and often more difficult than mere physical courage, on the part of public officials was called for, it is now. If we fail now the blood of millions of people may be on our hands.

But, sir, let me go a little further and ask whether we would be justified in plunging our Nation into this great war because our rights on the sea are being violated by Germany as a war measure. Of course, the President was right in his position that Germany could not, in a legal sense, be excused for voilating our rights because some other Nation was violating Germany's rights, as well as our own, in the same way. I am not discussing the question on the basis of legal or international right. Everybody knows that the rules of international law cannot stand in case of actual war between nations. They never have and they never will. The German government has declared a danger zone about its enemies and given notice that any vessel found in that zone, with certain exceptions, will be sunk. What should be our chance under such conditions? I say to keep our ships and our people out of this danger zone until the war is over or the embargo removed. Oh, but my belligerent but well meaning friends say this would be cowardly and beneath the dignity of a great Nation or one of its citizens. May God protect this Nation from that kind of courage. To avoid the horrors of war this act of prudence on the part of our Government. would be a great act of moral courage by a great country that should be a worthy and patriotic example to all the Nations of the world.

I insist that neither a private citizen nor the President nor the Congress of the United States can be justified in driving this Nation into war or endangering its peace by any such false

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

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The Nation's Honor

By Herbert S. Bigelow.

Is President Wilson right in the submarine controversy? If so, is it an issue which justifies a declaration of war? Both questions will be vehemently affirmed by Pro-Allies sympathizers, and denied by the Pro-Germans.

We shall try to answer the question as a Pro-American. England has established a blockade of German ports. She is using regular battleships. She is conducting the blockade according to the rules of international law. These rules were made with a view to the use of battleships.

Germany seeks to establish a blockade of English ports. Her only available weapon is the submarine. But a submarine blockade is a new thing and it cannot be conducted according to the rules of a battleship block-

Question? Has Germany a right to modify the rules so as to permit an effective use of her submarines? Is it reasonable for us to ignore the fact that in submarine warfare the old rules are obsolete? Is it just for us under the circumstances, to hold Germany to the letter of the law?

If an American ship were caught running the English blockade it would be ordered to stop. If it did not obey the order it would be sunk, crew and all. If it did stop it would have to be conducted to port, or if sunk, the crew would first have to be removed to a place of safety. This is international law and England can keep the law because she uses battleships.

To insist that Germany keep the letter of this law is to insist that she refrain from using her only available sea weapon. A submarine cannot come up to and notify an armed merchantman, nor conduct a merchantman to port, nor give refuge to the crew. Germany, therefore, says: "We cannot keep the letter of the law, but we keep the spirit of the law. We cannot warn the merchantman, at the time of the encounter, but we warn them in advance that our submarines have established a blockade of English ports. The world should be satisfied with this warning since it is all we can give." If a merchantman, ignoring the warning deliberately enters the submarine zones. and is sunk, is not its case parallel to that of a merchantman which ignores the order of a battleship and



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

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which are three-fourths again as high as they were a year ago. The prices of most meats have risen greatly, and there has been a considerable advance in the price of cereals. The increase in the price of all articles combined is about 25 per cent.

There is no way in which the food bill of the United States may be computed accurately, but roughly the 20 million families in the country probably spend on an average \$8.00 a week for food. The increase of 25 per cent in the cost of food would therefore add \$2.00 a week per family; 40 million dollars a week for all of the families, or 2 billions a year to the food bill of the people of the United States.

There is no way to compute the added cost to the people of this country of rent, fuel, clothing and the like.

The point can be made, however, with the food item alone. The total European war debt to date is about 50 billions, which will carry an interest charge of a little over 2 billions a year. The increase in the food bill of the American people during 1916 if continued for one year amounts to a like amount. In other words, the increase in food costs, paid by the American people this last year is equal to the total interest charge upon the European

"But," you say, "the war is still going on".

True, and the prices of foods are still going up. The American people are under another disadvantage. The European war debt must be carried by a population of about 400 millions. The increase in food costs of the United States—an amount equal to the interest on the European war debt-must be carried by 100 millions of people.

If it is true that "Europe must pay for this war", what are we paying for here in America?
