ABERDEEN, April 7 .- Judge J M. Phillips, republican primary nomnee, was elected mayor yesterday over Ash, socialist, by over 1,000 ma-

With the promise of a light vote through the day socialist success was feared, but the voters rallied in the afternoon and evening. The socialists, who have two members of the council, elected a third member from the First ward, which was carried by Anton Pista over H. B. Strong, republican, by five votes. In the Second ward, another socialist stronghold, the socialist candidate for councilman lost by thirty votes.

Mrs. Rose Damitio, the only woman candidate, and a socialist, lost in the Sixth ward for councilman by about ninety votes. Republican candidates for clerk, treasurer and police judge were elected.

CHICAGO.-For the first time in history, a negro, Oscar de Priest, was elected city councilman. The council will be made up of 33 democrats, 31 republicans, two progressives, three independents and one socialist.

THE ONLY SCHOOL

The school of experience is said to be a dear school, but it is the only one in which mankind will or can learn anything. With the average man the experience must be bitter in the extreme and long continued before he will abondon his previous habits or depart from old estiblished customs. Just now the working class is receiving the most drastic lesson in the school of experience. Hundreds of thousands of them are out of employment, and suffering the many privations and discomforts that this implies, because the present masters of industry cannot see their way clear to profitably employ them. This condition arises solely from the present system of private property in the means of wealth production, and out of the purpose for which production must be carried on under it. The purpose of capitalist production is profit. a price in advance of their cost. This implies a market in which they may be sold. If at any time the market should fall short of the requirements a halt must be called in production. This means that the labor force must be reduced by laying off some of the workers. Then the most pronounced and glaring evil of capitalist rule expresses itself in the misery and suffering that spreads like a plague throughout the ranks of the workers. A cry of distress is heard throughout the length and breadth of the land. Though they were actuated by the best motives it is absolutely impossible for capitalists and their defenders to offer a solution for the diffi-
